As the mentor for Mr. McCarthy's project, my primary objectives were to facilitate his acquisition of knowledge, encourage valuable learning experiences, and support the practical application of the insights gained. With these goals in mind, my guidance focused on identifying opportunities that would foster these concepts.

Mr. McCarthy participated in numerous workshops and music camps, not only to enhance his skills on the banjo but also to immerse himself in the rich culture of Appalachian music. My guidance encouraged him to maintain both daily and weekly journals, which allowed him to document his experiences and activities. This process was designed to help him reflect on his learning and carry forward valuable insights for the project.

The camps provided Mr. McCarthy with a foundation in composing music in the Appalachian style, while also allowing him to learn from professional musicians and seasoned performers. Appalachian music, rooted in an aural tradition, emphasizes repetition and group performance, both of which are essential to mastering its concepts.

Additionally, I encouraged Mr. McCarthy to explore funding opportunities through grants, pitch competitions, and other research avenues. His efforts in securing grants from various sources significantly contributed to the project's development and furthered his research into the creation and preservation of Appalachian music.
